I. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

III. READING OF ITEMS by the City Chamberlain of any resolutions not listed on the printed agenda.

IV. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION: Three (3) minutes per person up to 45 minutes of public comment on any agenda and non-agenda items.

Dory Marcinelli 31 Miller Road: CSEA Vice-President representing DPW, City Hall, and the Police Civilian Personnel. Has concerns about the layoffs that the Police Department is facing, and concerned about the cut in question of the youth worker Chris Reardon, goes on to say that Chris has been indispensable to them with how many cases he has taken on, in addition to all the other jobs he does within the department. The budget should help the citizens and workers of the city – especially those who help keep the city safe for residents and visitors. She points out how the Mayor makes exceptions for his friends when it comes to jobs and salaries. She said that the Mayor never indicated that the budget and contract would result in layoffs of CSEA members, and she finds it reprehensible that the city's budget should be balanced on the hardworking workers of the CSEA. She doesn't think that part time workers should be able to keep getting work when there are full time positions opening up and remaining vacant. She said that she doesn't find it fair that there are three clerical positions in one department, and yet only one in the police department. She thinks that the Mayor has been negligible and reckless with the tax increases prior to the state putting a cap on the tax increases.

Mark Cassak (Pleasant Valley): said that he wishes the City Administrator was there. Said that his position is one of the seven that the mayor's proposed 2016 budget does not feel is essential, and is one of four positions being eliminated in the city's 911 center. The people at the call center are the first people that the citizens talk to when they are in a crisis. By eliminating 25% of the department, the remaining employees will be overburdened. The clerical positions that are in jeopardy are also critical to the police

department as well as the juvenile officer. He urges the council to help do something to protect their jobs, which will in turn help protect the citizens of the city.

Damon Crumb 73 Mansion Street: stated the city has many problems to overcome before we can move forward financially. He proposes raising the market value of residential properties, thinks taxes for residential improvements should be frozen.

Tara Deloache 49 Carroll Street: expressed her concerns regarding the police department and how it's important and necessary. Said that the city is taking away too much from the police department and not giving enough back. The police department is being crippled by the cut backs. They need more from the city, the system is broken and corrupted – more should be done to help the police and impacted individuals. There should be less incriminating and more rehabilitating going on when it comes to the youth and first time offenders. She suggests community service outreach and better education programs. She has concerns for the kids who are going to school in the area, tells the council to put their egos aside and actually help their constituents.

India Wood Allen 11 Denver Road: said that she needs 911, and that she appreciates most of the police department and the fire department. She pleads with the council to not take away the brave men and women who help to try and protect and care for this city.

Bruce Doris 31 North Clover Street: supports everything Dori said before him, gives a breakdown of the budget and the current monetary needs of the city, calls for Milo Bunyi's immediate dismissal as City Administrator.

Anthony Sulfarro (Marlboro): President of the NYS police associations. Wanted to give facts on a memorandum of agreement that was entered into between the city and the PBA. More importantly, how it was fashioned, because he thinks that the council needs to understand that. This came from a state appointed mediator between the parties. A lot of work went into it. This particular mediator is not from the area, but took a lot of time and effort by listening to both parties positions, facts, evidence, requested the opportunity to write a findings and recommendation, both parties authorized that. When she finally issued it both parties agreed, even though everything wasn't what everyone wanted. It was a fair and balanced finding. We entered into a Memorandum of Agreement, it has now been ratified by the PBA, it's now up to the city council to ratify that, and I wanted for you to understand how that came about. It was very important, it wasn't crafted by us, it wasn't crafted by city Corporation Counsel, it was crafted by someone from the outside who looked at things, and it was a lot of work and it took months to come to an agreement. He urges, if not tonight, to support that Memorandum of Agreement.

Sean Fitzgerald (Esopus): PBA President. Wanted to follow on the heels of Anthony Sulfarro in regards to how the MOA was fashioned. He said it accurately, it was fashioned by a state mediator, and one of the points which is also included in the MOA that you have a copy of, is that the mediator followed the guidelines that are given to state arbitrators. For you to review, in her recommendation, she also points out that her recommendation is in line with the arbitrators guidelines, and should this have go forward to arbitration, it's her opinion that an arbitrator would find a very similar result through their process. The difference being, should this have to go to arbitration, the city will do

so, was well as the PBA at a significant additional cost to the point where we are at right now. Aside from that, he wanted to educate the council on a few things, the human element of police work. 2011 we lost John Falcone, 2014 we have two officer involved fatal shootings, after the public and the police were attacked with bladed instruments. We've had a member with a neck broken in a car accident responding to a call. We've had numerous members go out injured. All of us know the risks when we do the job. Some of us bare the physical, emotional and mental scars from doing that job. The contract that you are going to review in the near future is a fair contract in his opinion. It's a balanced contract. As Mr. Sulfarro pointed out, the mediator represented interest from both sides of the negotiating table. We are just asking that you all, when you review it, the things that we take on, that can't be quantified in line items and numbers on a piece of paper. They have been out of contract for almost four years, they started the negotiation process four years ago, prior to the contract expiring. The documents you all have before you are the end result of that process. We are just asking that you look at it fairly, objectively, and hopefully come to a good result for us. For all of the things that we do, chasing people with guns, seeing people on their worst days, seeing people that don't make it to the next day, it's all horrible, but we do it. Knowing that, he still doesn't envy the task that all of you have. Thank you.

Ken Stickle 118 Catharine Street: said that he wonders where the City Administrator and the Mayor are – especially the Mayor, as he's been missing in action for so long. He also wonders why the mayor came up with his budget numbers after the union contract was voted on. He said that the mayor is looking to cut jobs in the police department – such as the clerical positions that would help the officers be able to focus on their actual jobs, he's looking to downsize the juvenile department, kids these days don't respect the police officers in the city or even know who they are. He thinks the mayor should be thrown out of office right now – no waiting until January. He also agrees that City Administrator Bunyi should be kicked out of office as well. He said that he wonders why the property owners who let their tenants throw their garbage out in the city bins aren't being penalized.

Mr. Johnson 138 Garden Street: had no intention of speaking today, but he wanted to bring a pen back that someone had left at his home.

Tanya Pinea 16 Davies Place: said that her neighborhood is almost completely unlit but that the glare from the LED lights is really harsh. She thanked Councilmembers Perry and Johnson and Mr. Stickle and everyone else who helped fight for the public spaces over the year, asks everyone to call Governor Cuomo and veto the bill to alienate Wheaton Park, wonders why there's dangerous debris and equipment covering Wheaton Park – what made it okay for the city to allow Central Hudson to store their equipment in a public park space? She said that she wonders why anyone would give the fire and police department more stress to deal with by taking away their personnel.

Democracy is not a spectator sport. It relies on an informed and involved public--a public who is not reduced to spectator by failure or refusal of government to provide transparency and a free, uncensored flow of information. It relies on news media showing up to cover the news. According to Open Meetings Law, "Democracy, like a precious jewel, shines most brilliantly in the light of an open government."

On Sunday, October 10, the Poughkeepsie Journal printed an editorial supporting the alienation and sale of Wheaton Park. That editorial contained absolutely no mention of the developer's appearance before the City's IDA (Industrial Development Agency) seeking a 30-year tax abatement on the parcel, despite the original RFP weighting one-third of the decision on the developer's ability to finance. The RFP also stated no parking waivers, yet the developer is seeking a parking waiver. The developer claims his purchase offer is 20% greater than the City's appraisal of the property, yet the City has not made the appraisal available for public review. The developer proposes to reduce his purchase price further, depending on the condition of Pelton Mansion at the time of sale, yet the City fails to maintain the property and is letting Central Hudson use the park for heavy construction equipment and material. According to statements at the Dept. Head meeting, the City is allowing this without even a written contract. Does this also mean the City neglected to be named additionally insured on Central Hudson's insurance policy? If yes, did the City learn nothing from the \$1.4 million accident settlement at Kaal Rock?

The developer is seeking a 30-year tax abatement, with his offer contingent upon obtaining approval from the City's IDA for a "PILOT" (Payment in Lieu of Tax Agreement) with an initial tax payment of only \$500.00 per unit for all taxes for each unit. How should City residents make sense of this demand, when contrasted with the Mayor's recently released budget INCREASING the homestead tax rate by more than 5 percent?

Where was any mention of ANY of this information in the Poughkeepsie Journal's editorial? Why are the minutes and details of the September 17th IDA meeting NOT posted on the City's website?

Laurie Sandow – 10/19/15, Comments to Common Council (page 2 of 2)

The public deserves to know what's happening in meetings they can't attend in person. I propose that the same IDA Meeting held on September 17th be held AGAIN just prior to the next Common Council meeting scheduled for Nov. 4, that it be videotaped and broadcast, that minutes be taken and posted, and that no further IDA meetings take place until the September 17 meeting is held again in the light of public scrutiny. I further propose that NO current or future City committee meetings ever again be held without videotape or audio recording. These missing minutes--which turn public meetings into closed door meetings--are of special concern to all of us, especially when meetings are held at hours that most working people cannot attend. Open Meetings Law requires that minutes be taken at all meetings of public bodies, and that these minutes be made available to the public within two weeks or less of the date the meeting was held.

The missing minutes are of special concern to all of us. Open Meetings Law requires that minutes be taken at all meetings of public bodies. NY State's Authorities Budget Office often reviews minutes of the public authorities to see if the board is fulfilling its fiduciary duties. The same NYS Authorities Budget Office recently released a scathing audit of Poughkeepsie's IDA, noting among other things that (and I quote): "The IDA does not properly allocate the PILOTs received to taxing jurisdictions. ... As a result, the IDA gives the City of Poughkeepsie more than its share of PILOTs, while shortchanging Dutchess County and the Poughkeepsie School District. We found that for 2013 and 2014, the IDA provided the City of Poughkeepsie \$34,438 more than it should have in PILOTs, and underpaid a total of \$5,802 to the county and a total of \$28,636 to the school district." Who are the Recording Secretaries of Poughkeepsie's IDA (Industrial Development Agency), Charter Review Commission, Planning Board, Shade Tree Commission, Waterfront Advisory Committee, Zoning Board of Appeals, and Historic District & Landmark Preservation Commission. Why are there no audio or video records of these committee meetings? Where are the minutes from their meetings which, by law, must be sufficiently descriptive to enable the public and others to ascertain the nature of their work.

John Stitt (Juvenile Detective): said that New York is the last state to not raise the age to 18, he can barely keep up with the work he has now, everywhere else in the state is setting the grounds for more juvenile work and by taking away his juvenile workers the city will cripple what he can do.

WHEREAS, Soldiers Memorial Fountain and Park has is owned by the City of Poughkeepsie and has been nominated for designation as a historic landmark; and

WHEREAS, the City of Poughkeepsie Historic District and Landmarks Preservation Commission (hereinafter "HDLPC") held a public hearing on September 23, 2015 regarding the nomination of Soldier Memorial Fountain and Park as a local historic landmark; and

WHEREAS, the HDLPC voted in favor of the proposed nomination and approved the application on September 23, 2015; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 19-4.5(4)(f) of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Poughkeepsie, the HDLPC's approved application was forwarded to the Common Council for consideration on October 7, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council is required to hold a public hearing prior to the designation of any historic landmark within sixty (60) days from receipt of the approved application from the HDLPC; and

NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Chamberlain be, and she hereby is authorized and directed to publish a Notice of Public Hearing to be held November 16, 2015 at 5:30 p.m. concerning the designation of Soldiers Memorial Fountain and Park as a local historic landmark.

As many of you know who have been attending, or watching our meetings here at the Common Council, back in early summer the Hudson Valley Community Center, the former JCC approached the council with a proposal to rezone their parcel from R2 to R4, which is a higher density zoning in a residential space. At the time they were proposing taxable property that would provide and annuity in revenue stream to the center. And as is our charge here, if anyone comes forward and says we have a transformative project, it is our duty, our charge to air it out, we did, we held public hearings, and he held several public hearing above and beyond those that were required, after they were established as Lead Agency. To establish it, it became clear that there were some grave concerns, so they did not move forward with it. Nevertheless, as part of that process, the county did issue a letter of support for the rezoning itself, not necessarily for the proposal. As the councilmember overseeing the eight ward, he knows what his residents want, and what's in their best interest, and he has asked that they codify their opposition to the rezoning, and ask the Chamberlain to request from the county a recension of their letter of support so that this is a dead matter. He strongly encourages his colleagues to support this resolution.
